GIRLS TENNIS NOTES

- IMG Academy founder, Nick Bollettieri, founded the Nick Bollettieri Academy in 1978, and coached several girls tennis athletes that went onto become world No. 1's including Monica Seles, Mary Pierce, Maria Sharapova, Serena Williams and Venus Williams.
- The IMG Academy girls tennis program has produced 132 combined Grand Slam singles, doubles, and mixed doubles titles, eight of which were Grand Slam singles champions.
- There are 26 girls tennis alumni who have earned top-10 WTA rankings.
- The IMG Academy girls tennis program has produced world junior No. 1 Whitney Osuigwe and nine Eddie Herr Tournament singles champions.
- Since 2020, there have been over 28 girls tennis college commitments, with 21 committed to Division I schools.
- IMG Academy has had three girls tennis alumni become NCAA tennis champions including Mallory Cecil (Duke, singles and team), Danielle Collins (Virginia, singles) and Ingrid Neel (Florida, team).

GIRLS TENNIS 2023 STORYLINES

- **IMG Academy Becoming Hot Spot for International Student-Athletes:** The IMG Academy boys and girls tennis programs combined represent 44 different countries, and currently have partnerships with the Turkey, Japan, China and South Korean tennis federations to provide student-athletes the opportunity to compete at IMG Academy.
- Sayaka Ishii Turns Pro in 2023: Sayaka Ishii began playing tennis at the age of five. Coming from a sports family, Ishii was a natural competitor. In March of 2023 Sayaka Ishii joined the professional world of tennis after training at IMG Academy for several years. Ishii is currently ranked No. 6 in the world for juniors and was a quarter finalist in the 2023 Girls Singles Wimbledon Championship. Sayaka Ishii is ready to compete against the best of the best.
- Joining the Rankings in Top-25 Juniors: Ena Koike is ranked in the top-10 at No. 9. Wakana Sonobe is
 ranked in the top-25 at No. 21 junior girls. These two powerhouses are among some of the highest-level
 athletes in the country and have become prominent faces on the IMG Academy campus, training and using
 the facilities every day.
 - Ena Koike was a quarter finalist for both the 2023 girls singles and doubles Wimbledon Championship.
- A Budding Star from Pakistan: Haniya Minhas began playing tennis at the age of three and won her first tournament in Dubai at six. At eight years old, Minhas was ranked No. 8 in UAE. She then moved to Pakistan becoming the first ever Pakistani girl to be ranked No. 1 in the National Rankings. In three years, she won 90 titles and is now ranked No. 2 in the country. Minhas is currently 12-years-old and is becoming a stronger athlete training at IMG Academy. In 2022 alone she competed in seven tournaments, only losing a maximum of one match per tournament.
